
(Moved back from Library Park into the library)

Raising a bookworm - II

Toddler

© Read the same stories over and over again so your child can start making connections between words and pictures. Let your child choose the book that he wants you to read, and read it as often as possible, their favorites are their favorites for a reason.



- © Encourage your child to turn the book's pages.
- © Change your voice to match different characters or the actions taking place.
- Ask your child to name what is in the picture or what will happen next.

Preschooler

- Have your child follow along by moving your finger under the words as you read.
- © Encourage her to sound out simple words and phrases with you.
- Ask your kids which character they like best or what they think is going to happen next in the story.
- Make up a different ending to the story.
- © Do related activities together, like drawing a picture that describes the story.

Books

Big books, little books (hold hands out wide, bring together)
Short books, tall (hold I hand above other, spread apart)
Thin books, fat books (hold thumb and pointer close together, spread apart)

Blankie by Leslie Patricelli

Babies can safely sleep with a blanket after their first birthday, and the attachment to them can be fierce. This diaper clad kid who takes a blanket everywhere and talks about it as a friend ("I'm afraid of the dark. But Blankie isn't.") is reassuring to toddlers.

• Ten Little Ladybugs by Melanie Gerth

Touchable, three-dimensional ladybugs and bright, bold illustrations make this a wonderful book for infants. Toddlers can practice their numbers and colors, and identify familiar creatures in the illustrations. Ten Little Ladybugs provides hands-on learning and fun for babies of all ages.

The Rainbow Fish by Marcus Pfister

A beautiful book, in terms of story and illustrations! Parents will love the message this book teaches about sharing. Also an excellent bed-time story book, thanks to the restful colors and soothing text; the sparkling scales look great by night-light.

• The Very Hungry Caterpillar by Eric Carle

The story of a caterpillar's journey to becoming a butterfly, and his many meals in between, is a favorite for babies and parents. Younger babies will like the bright colors and simple pictures. Toddlers can sharpen their new-found counting skills by counting their way through the caterpillar's snacks. This classic book has been translated into 20 languages!

A you're adorable

A delicious trip through the alphabet. With charming illustrations this popular song of the 1940s has become a captivating picture book for all ages. Sing along as a lively company of children and assorted pets scamper across the bright pages and through the letters from A to Z. Need any more inspiration?
