
(Lakeport: "Storytime in the Park": Story time moves to Library Park from June 2nd until August 25th)

More information is available at your local library. While you are there check out these books so that your little one can fill the reading log quickly and win prices:

Summer by Giovanni Caviezel: Cheerful illustrations and the simple story awakens toddlers to their first understanding of nature's seasonal changes.



How do you know it's summer? By Lisa Herrington: Covering everything from weather patterns to animal behaviors to seasonal activities.

Mouse's first summer, by Lauren Thompson: A mouse and its mother celebrate summer.

I see summer, by Charles Ghigna: Illustrations and easy-to-read, rhyming text show what makes summer special, from sunshine and sailboats to ice cream and picnics.

Baby loves summer! : a Karen Katz lift-the-flap book on board pages.

Summer days and nights, by Wong Herbert Yee: A little girl enjoys the activities of a warm summer day and night. "...equally perfect for a storyhour or a cozy bedtime tale that will inspire summertime dreamers." 2-6

Summer, by Ailie Busby: There's something special about each season of the year, wherever we live in the world. Follow the children in this book as they explore the unique character of summer. This is the perfect introduction for young children to the cycles of the year.

Marshmallow kisses, by Linda Crotta Brennan: Children enjoy a variety of activities during a summer day.

Dog comes too, by Hazel Hutchins: Little dog is not about to stay behind when its owner goes off for a walk in the country. Toddlers will fall in love with little dog, whose quizzical expressions reflect the dilemmas he finds himself in. With

its predictable, repetitive pattern, the text lends itself perfectly to small children chiming in. For older preschoolers, the simple language makes it an ideal learn-to-read book.

Replace Daddy with other family members.




Check out this cute Father's Day card >

It makes a wonderful keepsake and daddy will LOVE it! Once you are done and the paint is dry, frame it.

What you need:

White card stock paper
Daddy's shoe or boot
Two different shades of Chalk Paint (see box below!)
Paintbrush
Kid's foot



Pain the sole of one of dad's boots or shoes with one color. As long as the paint is wet stamp it on the piece of white card stock paper. Paint your little one's foot with the other color and stamp it inside the middle of the boot print. Finish off the craft by writing "Following in my daddy's shoes" and add a little heart.



Here's another EASY **Father's Day card** to make with your kids, all you really need is paper and their hands. I think it's adorable and a dad would appreciate the message.

What you need:

blue construction paper, scissors, glue, a child's handprint, and a black marker.

DIY chalk paint:

All you need is water, cornstarch, food coloring and plastic cups.
Mix water and cornstarch in equal parts and add food coloring until it reaches the desired color.
It will dry more muted than the colors you see in the cups. Use paintbrush to apply

- on dad's shoe for this Father's Day craft, but also
- to sidewalks and driveways for a fun outdoor project!

Note: The paint is watersoluble, so artwork can be washed away later.

<u>What you do:</u> Start by tracing your child's hand on a dark blue piece of paper. Then cut out a small light blue heart to glue in the middle. Finish off the card by writing "It takes a big heart to hold a little hand" at the top of it. So cute!
